Current Trends in Post-Secondary Education and the Implications for K-12 Schools

Changing Times

In this session, we will explore trends that were evident this past year across the independent school landscape (in addition to all things COVID-19!). What are the past and emerging trends we see, and what can we learn from both?

This past school year, independent schools were mired in COVID-19 mitigation and response, while juggling both old and new issues that come with the responsibility of running a school. We will review some of the trends we've seen emerge from the pandemic, including a renewed focus on the standard of care and liability, the challenges of managing community polarity around politics and DEI, concerns regarding online learning, confusion over accommodations, the evolution of conduct jurisdiction and philosophy, enrollment agreements, and more. Each section will provide a high level overview of the topic at hand, with practical takeaways for your school to consider. Participation and audience discussion is encouraged.

③ Evidence-Based Accountability Plans: Measuring Progress Toward Strategic Goals and

Accreditation Recommendations Kelsev Vrooman & Dr. Anne-Marie Balzano

Leaders and trustees want their school to be rooted in mission-driven, data-informed decision making, yet many schools struggle to turn strategic plans, visionary initiatives, and accreditation recommendations into action and to effectively communicate progress to the board. Join Kelsey and Anne-Marie as they walk trustees and school leaders through research-based processes for building robust accountability plans. We will explore how to align success metrics to strategic goals and accreditation recommendations, share strategies on how to measure subjective goals such as joyful learners or engaged students, and share examples of effective strategic plan dashboards.

④ Board Habits to Foster Generative Thinking and Collective Purpose Kawai Lai and Keara Mascareñaz

As we emerge from a remarkable time in our lives and in our schools, now more than ever, boards must be generative, and future-focused. How do we become more generative, and why is this important for a board? How do we bring clarity to our collective purpose? What are small changes we can make on our board to create a more meaningful impact for the school? This session is designed for board chairs, committee chairs, and heads of school who are interested in forming new board habits to help their board use a future-focus and generative thinking to respond to the needs of their community.

(5) Where Are Your Ideal Families Now? Where Will They Be in 2025? Mike Connor

Imagine identifying in real time where the most mission-appropriate families in your market live – those who share the characteristics, values, and attitudes of the families you would like to replicate at your school. These families may represent your school's most ideal family prospects who share interest in mission-dependent flagship programs at your school such as arts, athletics, and social justice. Where do the families live now? Where will they be in 2025?

The Enrollment Feasibility and Forecasting approach, pioneered by Connor Associates for independent schools, is popular with boards that want to make enrollment and income projections based on highly customizable data. Enrollment managers report that this approach typically gains 25 new applications and 12 new enrollments, where it pays for itself ten times over. Its purpose is to highly target areas where resources should be spent on marketing—areas where you will get the most bang for your buck now and in the foreseeable future.

2 Governing Conduct & Keeping School Communities Safe Megan Mann

While the goal of safety has always been clearly paramount for our school leaders, there often exists confusion about what reasonable steps we should take to enhance that safety. For example, how should schools handle boundary-blurring employee conduct or off-campus student conduct? Beyond safety, how should your school handle conduct that might negatively impact the reputation of the school? Does it matter if this conduct occurs off campus at a private event? What conduct is appropriate to govern and how? These are just a few of the questions our school leaders face and which we will tackle in this interactive presentation. Spoiler Alert: There are very few clearcut answers! There are, however, common issues we see across the country which we will discuss together. Additionally, we will review different hypothetical scenarios so that attendees can discuss these challenges and learn from each other. Our goal in this session will be to raise awareness of these concerns and talk through the different ways a school can address the concerns of its own community.

③ Measure What Matters: Best Practices for Board Dashboards Kelsey Vrooman

Paul Drucker is credited as saying, "What gets measured gets managed." With this caveat in mind, the data included on a board dashboard is a critical tool in directing the board's attention and focusing the work of committees. While the interface is important, the true power of a board dashboard comes when it is used to engage board members at all levels of data literacy in dynamic and strategic discussions about the past, present, and future of the school. Join Kelsey to dive into best practices for board dashboards, including key indicators of financial health, enrollment strength, and student success. This session will also cover how to build early warning systems to address trends before they become crises.

Sound familiar?

If you work in enrollment management, fundraising, or marcom, do you find it difficult to convince faculty, staff, the head of school, the business manager, the board of trustees, or others about the value of marketing? While many may equate marketing with external promotion, public relations, or advertising, making the most of these external initiatives begins with a cohesive and collaborative internal marketing effort that serves everyone's individual interests and the success of the school as a whole. By listening and looking for internal opportunities to collaborate, by listening carefully to those you seek to serve internally and externally, and by making sure all stakeholders understand the important interdependence of independent schools, a school can maximize its marketing and advance its mission.

Under Adam's leadership, Denison has expanded the curriculum with a new generation academic and global programs, as well as a deepening of the arts, including the construction of the *Michael D. Eisner Center for the Performing Arts.* Denison's new programs in Global Commerce, Data Analytics, Financial Economics, Narrative Journalism, and Health, Exercise and Sports Studies are forging new pathways for the liberal arts.
